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National Recognition for Illinois' Principal Preparation Work: A new report from the Foundation for Child Development, PreK-3rd: Principals as Crucial Instructional Leaders, recognizes Illinois' new P-12 Principal Endorsement standards, which are the first in the nation to require the incorporation of early learning content into principal preparation. This policy brief recognizes the important role that principals play with aligning standards, curriculum, instructional strategies, and assessments from PreK through the elementary grades and gives strategies for assisting principals with the skills and knowledge to do this work.

International Perspective on Teacher and Leader Effectiveness:

Educator Effectiveness and Evaluation – What Other States Are Doing:

- A Colorado council has created a definition of an effective educator, as was required by S.B. 191.
 The definition consists of six quality standards, including showing content knowledge,
 demonstrating leadership and taking responsibility for student growth. The council's <u>report</u> also
 made 60 recommendations on evaluating teachers and principals, based partly on student
