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PROGRAM MODEL

The program includes five online graduate-level courses. Completion of the courses leads to a graduate certificate from Illinois State University and can lead to a *Learning Behavior Specialist 2:* Multiple Disabilities licensure from the Illinois State Board of Education for eligible individuals who pass the state certification test.

Courses will be offered in a fully **online hybrid model**, meeting via synchronous webinars every Tuesday evening for a six-week summer course and every other Tuesday evening during the fall and spring. All other course work is also online. Each course includes applied projects that involve working with students perceived as having moderate, severe, and multiple disabilities and extensive/pervasive support needs and their families.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Submit the following application materials through the Illinois State University Office of Admissions online application system, available at Grad.IllinoisState.edu/Admission:

- An application letter that includes the following information:
 - A description of your experience working with individuals perceived as having moderate, severe, or multiple disabilities and extensive/pervasive support needs;
 - An assessment of your strengths and areas for improvement related to teaching individuals perceived as having moderate, severe, or multiple disabilities and extensive/pervasive support needs; and
 - At least three specific learning goals you plan to accomplish during the program
- A current resume
- A letter documenting a minimum of one year of successful teaching experience
- An official transcript from each higher education institution you have attended
- A copy of your current teaching certificates
- Names and email addresses for three references

Applicants with experience teaching students perceived as having severe or multiple disabilities will be given preference.
