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EIGHTEEN STATES in 1969 have made biennial appropriations by separate fiscal years, so that the sums appropriated for fiscal year 1970-71 can be observed nearly a year in advance.

Table 12, above, shows the amounts for 1970-71 in Column 4. The rate of gain for fiscal year 1970-71 over fiscal year 1968-69, two years earlier, appears to be 34 per cent (Column 5).

This is not an accurate indication of the total picture of the fifty states in 1970-71, because the eighteen states listed here include neither New York nor California, which together have nearly one-fifth of the nation's population. They include only two (Ohio and Texas) of the ten largest states; and most of the others listed are well below average population.

These eighteen states also include a preponderance of those having slow gains or no gains in population; and six of them (Iowa, Montana, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Oregon, and Wyoming) rank between forty-first and forty-eighth as to ten-year rate of gain in appropriations for annual operating expenses of higher education, 1959-60 through 1969-70. Thus the two-year gain of 34 per cent shown here probably substantially undershoots the mark for 1970-71. The final result will be influenced by economic conditions and the mood of the legislatures in 1970.

\* This total appears to be almost exactly the same as the total for the preceding fiscal year 1968-69. We are told that the legislature appropriated larger sums but authorized the governor to reduce them upon evidence of probable insufficiency of revenue. He exercised this power with the result that there is almost no gain over the immediately preceding year.

The total for fiscal year 1969-70 seems to be a gain of about 6-1/2 per cent over the comparable figure for fiscal year 1967-68, two years earlier. This is probably the smallest two-year rate of gain in any state over that period.

The ten-year rate of gain since fiscal year 1959-60 appears to be 148 per cent, placing Louisiana and North Dakota in a tie for fourth lowest ten-year rate of gain among the fifty states.

MISSOURI. A recent special session increased the maximum rate of the graduated personal income tax to 6 per cent from the present 4 per cent, effective January 1, 1970; and raised the corporation income tax to 5 per cent from the present 2 per cent. The changes are expected to bring in \$113 million of added revenue over 18 months.

PENNSYLVANIA. As of October 1, 1969 the legislature had not accomplished the enactment of appropriation acts for fiscal year 1969-70, except for \$2.1 billion— the amount that existing taxes are expected to produce.

As noted in GRAPEVINE, No. 133, page 847, the only appropriation for operating expenses of higher education thus far was \$68 million for the 14 "state-owned" institutions (the Indiana University of Pennsylvania and 13 state colleges).

This left the Pennsylvania State University and the two big "state-related" private universities (Temple and Pittsburgh) without appropriations, though the first quarter of the fiscal year had already passed. The same was true for a dozen other "state-aided" private universities and colleges, including four independent medical colleges.

The Democratic House and the Republican Senate were deadlocked on the question of how the necessary new revenue should be raised. The delay and the consequent suspension of the normal flow of state payments was extremely costly to the "Commonwealth Segment" of higher education -- the state-supported Pennsylvania State University, and the "state-related" Temple University and the University of Pittsburgh, which have been receiving appropriations of many millions as "tuition reduction supplements" since 1966, in addition to their other state subsidies for their general operation and special appropriations for their medical schools.

The total for fiscal year 1969-70 appears to be a gain of 45-1/4 per cent over the comparable figure for fiscal year 1967-68, two years earlier.

The ten-year gain since fiscal year 1959-60 is 337 per cent.

Texas is now the fourth state among the fifty in the magnitude of its total appropriations for annual operating expenses of higher education. Only California, New York, and Illinois, in that order, are above Texas.

This present annual summary comes at the end of a decade. Hence it provides a stimulus toward pondering the record of the past and the prospects of the future.

At the moment, neither time nor space permit extensive or detailed analyses of the full ten-year record. Some work of that kind will appear later in GRAPEVINE, and through other outlets.

## A 9-Year Record in Detail Is Also Obtainable

The tabulations for each state, with breakdowns to institutions and major units, for each fiscal year from 1960 through 1969, have been assembled in a 14 by 17-inch document of 45 pages which shows the detailed data for each state in one place on a page or page-spread. Included also are 9-year summary tables and about 60 graphs. This is A Record of Progress, published in 1969 and available from the Interstate Publishers, Inc., Danville, Illinois 61832, at \$10 per copy, postpaid.

The year 1970 is not a summit. It is a mid-point in a twenty-year period of expansion and development of public higher education in the United States. In general, the trends of the decade just past will continue until 1980 with no great deflection. The evidence is everywhere in the statistics of births prior to 1958, in the necessity of at least some education beyond high school for all persons in an age of advancing technology, complexity of social problems, and economic progress.

#### Continued Sound Growth

This present report for fiscal year 1969-70 indicates that the total tax-fund contributions of the states to the operating income of higher education has exceeded \$6.1 billion, with a dollar gain of about \$1.1 billion since one year earlier, and about \$1.7 billion over the most recent two years.

These dollar gains are larger than in preceding comparable periods; but the percentage of gain, as might well have been expected, shows a slight downward turn-being about 38-1/2 per cent over the most recent two years, as compared with figures generally above 40 per cent for other comparable periods since 1965.

Insofar as it represents any slowdown, it is scarcely at all a reflection of public anger at student unrest, but is much more probably a result of the slight rightward swing in the state and national elections of 1968.

With a very few conspicuous exceptions, legislatures and governors continue to develop the wise policy of increasing state support for public higher education in long strides.
