*** South Carolina's percentages of gain are overstated because the total for 1970-71 properly includes \$6,436,000 for agricultural research and extension-- categories apparently not reported in previous years. With this item excluded from 1970-71, the 2-year gain would be 57 per cent, and the ten-year gain 374-1/2 per cent. In the fifty-state picture as a whole, these discrepancies are virtually negligible, because South Carolina's annual total has thus far been less than one per cent of the fifty-state total; and the sums involved in that state's agricultural research and extension are less than one-tenth of one per cent of the fifty-state totals of state tax funds for higher education.

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IDAHO. Appropriations of state tax funds for operating expenses for biennium 1969-71 were reported on GRAPEVINE page 822, Table 79, as a biennial total of \$59,724,000. Half of that biennial total would be \$29,862,000 for each of the two fiscal years.

The Second Session of the 40th Legislature, meeting early in 1970, made supplemental appropriations aggregating \$1,350,000, to be allocated among the four institutions at the discretion of the State Board of Education.

Additional special appropriations were made as follows:

\$50,000 each to the College of Southern Idaho and to North Idaho Junior College to implement programs for the training of nurses;

\$38,000 to the College of Southern Idaho, and \$26,000 to North Idaho Junior College to cover retirement benefit payments for the two institutions;

\$50,000 to be divided between Boise State College and Lewis-Clark Normal School for the maintenance with a view to possible future acquisition of abandoned Job Corps Centers at Mountain Home and Cedar Flats;

\$80,000 for educational television.

Adding these items apparently brings the total of new funds up to \$1,644,000.

While the new money may not all be attributable to fiscal year 1970-71, if it be treated as such it may be said to raise the total for that year to \$31,506,000, representing an apparent gain of about 53 per cent over the comparable sum for fiscal year 1968-69, two years earlier.

The ten-year gain since fiscal year 1960-61 becomes 259 per cent.

MISSOURI. The increases in the state personal and corporate income taxes enacted by the 1969 special session and supported by Governor Hearnes were defeated in a statewide popular referendum election April 7, 1970.

The defeat of the income tax increases means a loss of an estimated \$106 million of revenue for fiscal year 1970-71, unless other steps are taken.

The total for fiscal year 1970-71 is a gain of 35 per cent over the comparable figure for fiscal year 1968-69, two years earlier. The ten-year gain since fiscal year 1960-61 is 334 per cent.

WISCONSIN. Biennial appropriations were made in 1969 by separate fiscal years, for 1969-70 and 1970-71; but allocations by the boards of regents to the separate institutions and branches for fiscal year 1970-71, not previously reported in GRAPEVINE, appear in the next column on this page.

The total for fiscal year 1970-71 appears to be a gain of about 16-1/2 per cent over the comparable figure for fiscal year 1968-69, two years earlier. The ten-year gain since 1960-61 is 360 per cent.

PENNSYLVANIA. At the end of February 1970 the legislature completed the appropriations for fiscal year 1969-70. An additional appropriation was also made to supplement the amount originally appropriated to the 14 "state-owned" institutions in June 1969 for fiscal year 1969-70.

The delay of many months in completing the appropriations was due to a deadlock over new revenue measures. Governor Shafer unsuccessfully advocated a new personal income tax. At length a tax on insurance premiums, which would have produced \$41 million a year, was enacted, but repealed within a week because of pressure from insurance companies. At the same time a measure accelerating the due dates for the corporation income tax, promising the state a one-shot windfall of about \$100 million, was enacted, thus clearing the way for agreement on the state budget for fiscal year 1969-70.
