With 45 states reported, the cumulative total for fiscal year 1971-72 is \$6.8 billion. This is \$0.7 billion more than the fifty-state total for fiscal year 1969-70, two years ago; and \$0.2 billion less than the \$7 billion fifty-state total for fiscal eyar 1970-71.

The five states currently unreported for 1971-72 are Alabama, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Ohio, and Wisconsin. These states will undoubtedly aggregate between \$0.7 and \$0.9 billion, bringing the fifty-state total for fiscal year 1971-72 up to some point between \$7.5 billion and \$7.7 billion.









CALIFORNIA. (CORRECTION for page 998): Although this is the second consecutive year in which no appropriations were made for general salary increases at the University and the State Colleges, we are told that in 1970-71 the Reagan administration budgeted \$14,700,000 for that purpose, but the item was eliminated by the legislative Joint Conference Committee.

\* As will be observed in Table 13, page 1006, the legislature appropriated \$112,899,000 to the Board of Regents for allocation among the seven universities, and made separate appropriations direct to medical units, agricultural research and extension units, and certain other enterprises that are appendages of some of the larger universities.

To remedy this fragmentation of institutions, it is necessary to add such direct appropriations to the sum allocated by the Board of Regents to obtain a total of institutional tax support, roughly comparable to that of similar institutions in other states:

IOWA. (Revised table for fiscal year 1971-72): To show the two fiscal years of the current biennium separately, and to add \$4 million per year for tuition grants to private college students, Table 21 herein is a complete revision of the earlier table for Iowa.

#### Tuition Grants for Students in Denominational Colleges are Unconstitutional in South Carolina

"The property or credit of the State of South Carolina, or any public money, from whatever source derived, shall not, by gift, donation, loan, contract, appropriation, or otherwise, be used, directly or indirectly, in aid or maintenance of any college, school, hospital, orphan house, or other institution, society or organization of what ever kind, which is wholly or in part under the direction or control of any church or of any religious or sectarian denomination, society or organization." This section of the state constitution has been held by the state supreme court to invalidate and prohibit "tuition grants" of state tax funds directly to students in sectarian colleges in South Carolina. 1/

The court rejected the argument that such grants are primarily for the benefit of the students as individuals to enable them to attend the college of their choice, and that any resultant benefit to the collegis no more than incidental and negligible, or of such minor consequences as not to contravene the state constitution.

There may be subsequent litigation to resolve such questions as precisely what constitutes denominational or sectarian control. Some other states, notably Michigan and Iowa, have relatively new legislation providing for students in private colleges. Whether the constitutionality of these statutes may be litigated in the respective states depends in part on the exact wording of different prohibitory clauses that are found in more than forty state constitutions.

New York appropriates currently about \$30 million annually to private colleges directly, but only a handful of the 143 church-connected colleges have been classified as nonsectarian and thus eligible under the state constitution.
