The first twenty-six states to report appropriations for fiscal year 1973-74 come up to a total of about \$3 billion. Though these states exceed one-half of the 50 in number, their aggregate appropriations represent probably less than one-third of the total involved for fiscal year 1973-74.

This is because the smaller states in point of population generally have shorter legislative sessions. Only two of the ten largest states are yet reported. GRAPEVINE will circulate the reports of the 24 remaining states during the summer months as soon as they are obtained; and produce the customary annual summary of the 50 states during the Autumn.

Meantime, it is encouraging to note that the average two-year gain of the 26 states already reported stands at 25 1/4 per cent, about three points higher than the average for all 50 states for fiscal year 1972-73, now past. This may indicate a bit of an upturn from the panicky parsimony of the early 70's. Whether the upturn will be maintained by the larger states remains to be seen. Certainly most of the 26 legislatures merit a degree of commendation and congratulation, though better gains may be hoped for in the middle Seventies.

Scheduled to be off the press of the Interstate Printers and Publishers, Inc. of Danville, Illinois 61832 July 25, 1973 is a 288-page book by M. M. Chambers, dealing with the rights and obligations of faculty members under some 200 decisions, mostly of federal courts during the most recent five years.

One chapter analyzes the impact of the two decisions of the U.S. Supreme Court of June 29, 1972, relating to the renewal of contracts of nontenured teachers.

Other chapters cover such matters as discharge for cause; resignation and retirement; "moonlighting"; protection against discrimination as to race, religion, sex, and ideology; the right of association and of petition; collective negotiations; and many others.

This is a companion volume for The Developing Law of the Student and the College, a 316-page book released by the same publisher in June 1972.
