The 48-state total of \$9 billion shown in Table 58 is not to be mistaken for a nationwide 50-state total. Two large states--Massachusetts and Pennsylvania, are unreported. They will be reported in the November 1973 issue of GRAPEVINE, and will raise the nationwide total substantially.

At the same time, a complete 30-page summary of Appropriations of State Tax Funds for Operating Expenses of Higher Education, 1973-74 will be processed by the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and made ready for circulation. A condensed type of comprehensive annual summary will be prepared for publication in the national weekly, Chronicle of Higher Education. A shorter story will be prepared for one of the national news services. Simultaneously, on a date early in November, it is expected that GRAPEVINE and all the above-named media will release their respective stories and reports. Early November is the apex of the year for this enterprise.

GRAPEVINE is not a publication of any institution or association. Responsibility for any errors in the data, or for opinions expressed, is not to be attributed to any organization or person other than M. M. Chambers. GRAPEVINE is circulated to numerous key persons in each of the fifty states.

OKLAHOMA. The Higher Education Alumni Council of Oklahoma is a statewide organization involving alumni of all the state institutions of higher education, and other supporters of public education beyond high school. It publishes a Faculty-Alumni Newsletter in which (for June 1973) it circulated a tabulation showing a total of \$90,720,553 appropriated to the Oklahoma Regents for Higher Education for allocation to all the institutions and branch campuses for fiscal year 1973-74.

That figure is more than \$8 million less than GRAPEVINE's figure of \$98,812,000 (Number 181, page 1159, August 1973). The differences:

(1) The supplementary appropriation to the University of Oklahoma of \$777,000 was for operating expenses from March 1, 1973, to June 30, 1973, and does not belong to fiscal year 1973-74, says the Faculty-Alumni Newsletter editor.

(2) The appropriation of \$5,495,000 to the University Hospitals is not classifiable as for higher education, it is said, because it is largely for the support of a large charitable hospital for the care of indigent persons, and only a small part of the money will support the teaching activities of the university medical school therein. (A similar fog-giness exists in many other states as to the exact relations between state university medical schools and their teaching hospitals.) Aware of the impossibility of obtaining an exact accounting of this matter, GRAPEVINE has generally attributed the entire hospital appropriation to higher education, on the theory that a medical school needs a very large and varied pool of patients for its teaching purposes. We are reluctant, then, to make any large deduction from this item.

(3) The \$1 million appropriation to the Animal Diagnostic Laboratory at Oklahoma State University appears to have been for plant construction, and as such should not appear in the tabulation of appropriations for annual operating expenses. From the preliminary budget for the next succeeding year, it seems that about \$225,000 may be appropriated for annual operating expenses of the Animal

Diagnostic Laboratory; it is not stated that any appropriation for that purpose was made for fiscal year 1973-74.

We are mindful of the fact that Oklahoma's constitution forbids any appropriation for higher education except to the Regents of Higher Education; and that the appropriation for 1973-74 of \$5,495,000 to the University Hospitals was not made to the Regents, but to the Hospitals, with expression of intent that an unspecified part would be used to "underwrite educational activities" under agreements with the University of Oklahoma. Another act transferred the Oklahoma Children's Hospital from the jurisdiction of the Regents of the University of Oklahoma to the State Department of Welfare.

Our conclusion for the present is that we will deduct the supplemental appropriation of \$777,000 because it belongs to the preceding fiscal year; we will deduct the \$1 million for the Animal Diagnostic Laboratory because it is for capital outlay, not operating expense; and deduct \$1 million from the hospital appropriation, thus reducing our statewide total for higher education to \$96,038,000. As always, our figures will be subject to subsequent rectification when necessary.

We are also indebted to the Oklahoma Higher Education Alumni Council for the allocations by Regents of Higher Education of the \$2,274,000 appropriated for state aid to six local public 2-year colleges, as shown in Table 65.
