FORTY STATES (CUMULATIVELY REPORTED PRIOR TO JULY 15, 1974) MAKE AVERAGE TWO-YEAR GAINS OF TWENTY-NINE PER CENT.

In recent prior issues GRAPEVINE has reported appropriations of state tax funds for annual operating expenses of higher education for fiscal year 1974-75 by 29 states. This present issue adds eleven states, bringing the total to forty. As successively reported in groups, thirteen states showed average two-year gains of 18 per cent; eight states, 28 per cent; eight states, 34 per cent; and eleven states, 37 per cent.

At the present moment, the cumulative average two-year gain for all 40 of the states is 29 per cent, which compares favorably with the average of 25 per cent reported for all fifty states for fiscal year 1973-74, one year earlier. The progression of 18-28-34-37 seems to sustain the tentative conjecture that an upturn is in the making.
