It is noteworthy that the two-year weighted average gain for thirty states thus far reported (29 per cent) is well above the rate of general inflation over the same two years, and thus in part represents "real gain" in economic jargon.

It would not be true to say all <u>four-year</u> institutions have made "real gains."

The over-all statewide and nationwide gains tend to be somewhat higher for junior or community colleges and vocational-technical institutes than for four-year colleges and universities.

Many of the doleful doomsday statistics currently bandied about are based on a limited universe, much smaller than the entire statewide complex of tax-supported education beyond the high school. GRAPEVINE adheres to the total statewide base.
