Table 72 omits New York, which was reported in Table 66 as having a two-year gain of only 3 per cent. New York's statewide total (\$1,298,754,000) is so relatively large that if included in Table 72 it would deceptively skew the cumulative weighted average two-year gain for 22 states and distort the picture of what 21 other states have reported at this point (July 1, 1977).

This skewing effect was so great that the cumulative average for the first five states reported (29 per cent) was dropped to 14 per cent for the first ten, among which New York was included. To avoid this distortion and offer a better view of what is occurring among the cumulative list of states across the land, GRAPEVINE is temporarily withholding from the cumulative list any state reporting a two-year gain of less than 11 per cent (which is without doubt no more than the concurrent rate of general inflation, and represents standstill or decline in statewide tax support of higher education).

For fiscal 1977 (one year ago) our annual summation showed only seven such states: Florida, Illinois, New York, New Jersey, and three New England states. Two-year gains were sufficient in the other 43 states to bring the cumulative fifty-state weighted average up to 24 per cent (Table 51, page 1410, November 1976). At this stage in the middle of calendar 1977, the only state reported in that category is new York. Vermont has climbed out of it. Twenty-eight states are yet to be reported.
