Reference the April, 1981 issue of "Grapevine" No. 274, page 1731, I should like to correct the statement about Pennsylvania. The paragraph states that the public higher education system is capped by Penn State University with 20 or more branch campuses. Please be advised that Penn State University has a private charter, the same as Temple University, University of Pittsburgh and Lincoln University. Public education in Pennsylvania consists of the community colleges and the state owned colleges.

Further in the paragraph there is reference to a "compliment of about 35 local public state-aided community colleges." Pennsylvania has only 14 community colleges.

In that I enjoy reading the newsletter which has served me well these many years, I hope that corrections as described can be made.

GRAPEVINE's response: Mr. Evans is right. In a short paragraph very briefly sketching Pennsylvania's system of higher education we felt justified in saying it is "capped by Penn State," even though we had long been aware of Penn State's status as a private corporation, and had mentioned it in earlier issues and in other publications. For most practical purposes, Penn State now bears much the same relation to the state as do the "flagship" state universities in other states. We are grateful to Mr. Evans for his allegiance to accuracy, and thank him for his kind words about GRAPEVINE.
