The table on the next page lists those universities which received \$100,000,000 or more of state tax funds and which have one or more campuses located away from the "main campus." Seven of these universities are part of a larger system and were included in the table of consolidated systems which appeared in the March issue of <u>Grapevine</u>, page 2288, (Arizona State U, U of Iowa, U of Kansas, U of Massachusetts, U of Mississippi, U of Wisconsin, West Virginia U). There are 24 more institutions which received over \$100,000,000 of state tax funds for annual operating expenses in FY1990, but they do not have branch campuses. Taken together, the appropriations to these 64, large, comprehensive, doctoral-granting institutions comprised slightly more than 41% of the dollars appropriated for all of higher education, nation-wide.
